The concert will feature the three manuel, 54 rank Letourneau pipe organ, Opus 52, installed in the church in 2000. The music will span the centuries with pieces from the renaissance period through contemporary.

Oberammergau Passion Play European Capitals Tour: September 21-30, 2022 with Rev. Keith & Colleen Treman



Since 1634, the most famous Passion Play in the World has been presented every 10 years in Oberammergau, Germany. The worldwide virus pandemic of 2020 forced the Play organizers to move the production to 2022–only the 4th time in almost 400 years that the Play has been canceled or postponed.

Educational Opportunities Tours invites you to join an estimated 450,000 visitors from around the world, in the small village of Oberammergau for this special Play season. Travelers will experience the world's largest dramatic and musical Passion Play in the beautiful Bavaria and Tyrol regions of Germany and Austria.

For those who thought they missed the Passion Play in 2020, this is a rare second chance to see the event of a lifetime. Many EO travelers moved their 2020 plans to 2022, but tickets and hotel space have been reserved for additional travelers to join in 2022.

Travelers will enjoy ten days in Germany, Austria and Prague. They'll explore Innsbruck, Prague, Dresden, Leipzig, and Berlin. Tickets to the Oberammergau Passion Play are included with time to explore the sites in southern Germany, such as Ettal. Price starts at \$4,698 per person and trip departs out of New York.



Celebrating Our Ministries Reconciling Ministry Team

There is a banner hanging in the hall on the way to the sanctuary, just next to the Perks area. Maybe you've seen it, but have forgotten about it since we haven't been in the building for a while. Maybe you haven't seen it because you attend church online or at a satellite service. The image above shows the banner which alerts all who pass that we are a reconciling congregation. So what does being a reconciling congregation mean?

In October 2005 the Church Council adopted a Strategic Plan with several goals, including Invite, welcome and accept all persons with open hearts, open minds and open doors with Christ-Like Hospitality. A part of implementing this goal was to "Explore whether our church should join the UMC Reconciling Ministries Network."

In August 2006, a Reconciling Ministries Study Group was formed consisting of upwards of twenty First Church members and staff to carry out this assignment. This Study Group met over the next two plus years which ultimately led to a Special Church Conference, in 2008, chaired by Kalamazoo District Superintendent Neil Davis to receive and act on the Report and Recommendations of the Study Group. First Church members present overwhelmingly approved the adoption of the following statement and to join the reconciling ministry network.

"First United Methodist Church of Kalamazoo invites all persons to join us in our journey of faith. Jesus Christ calls us to be an inclusive church that exemplifies the kingdom of God. We strive to move toward reconciling relationship with all, affirming those who are marginalized for any reason, including sexual orientation or gender identity. We welcome all with open hearts, open minds and open doors."

Since that time, First Church has participated in Pride Events (even virtually during Covid), offered Bible studies, Academy Classes, and book studies, and received the annual Faith Award from the Kalamazoo Gay and Lesbian Resource Center for being a Reconciling Congregation. In April 2014, First Church sponsored a two-day opportunity called "Biblical Obedience: Reconciling Ministries and Marriage Equality" led by Bishop Melvin G. Talbert. Upwards of 100 people from across Michigan attended a Saturday conversation with Bishop Talbert and others. He was guest preacher the following day and First Church Clergy Steve Charnley, Julie Kline and

Dan Duncan sent a letter to the congregation saying:

"We, your pastoral servant leaders, with hearts full of love for those we serve, are writing to you about our mutual and prayerful decision to offer our pastoral ministry to all couples in our congregation who earnestly and prayerfully seek to be married. For us, marriage equality is more than a political issue or a judicial decision, it is a matter of heeding our call to be pastors and offer without prejudice our pastoral care and support for those who request it."

Beginning in 2017, the Reconciling Ministry Team began to expand its work to include anti-bias and anti-racism discussions. Throughout the years following, over fifty congregants have attended anti-racism training, others have participated in various book studies, Academy Classes, and video presentations which led to the affirmation and blessing by Church Council of the following:

As part of Kalamazoo First United Methodist Church's vow to resist oppression in all its forms, we, the Church Council, commit ourselves to the decisive action that is needed to resist and dismantle racism at every level. This action must go beyond our historically empty rhetoric about repentance and broken promises to be a church that is a credible and active witness for peace, equity and justice in the face of harm visited upon communities of color. We beckon our clergy and lay leadership to unapologetically shine the light of truth on our church community so that we recognize our complicity in systemic racism, recognize and condemn white supremacy as sin, and seek a deep knowing of what God calls us to do. We make these vows so that every person—especially Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC)—may live in safety, health, and freedom.

The Reconciling Team continues to be in ministry with the congregation to live into our baptismal vows "Do you accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves?" And we answer, "we will."

We praise God for the generosity of our congregation as we complete the second year of the Dream campaign for affordable housing for all! We thank God that many individuals have been housed by Kalamazoo Collective and the YWCA with Dream funds. We are grateful to God that families have been able to stay in their homes thanks to critical home repairs made by Community Homeworks. We praise God that Building Blocks has helped to increase safety and neighborhood engagement in parts of our city through Dream contributions. We beseech God to allow the good work of all of our seven partners to continue in the year ahead. We ask God to continue to open hearts and minds to contributing of their time and money to the Dream and we seek God's guidance in the team's decision making in the year ahead.
