

Dear Friends,

As we are midway through the season of Advent, our hearts and minds begin to turn toward our celebration of Christmas Eve. This year we come with anticipation as celebrating the birth of Jesus is a beloved and cherished tradition. We also know that last year we celebrated from home and were not able to gather in the sanctuary and this makes us yearn for our traditions ever more. We also acknowledge that our community is experiencing a high rate of Covid illnesses and hospitalizations, and this too brings its own worries and concerns.

At this time, we are planning to celebrate Christmas Eve at these times:

- **4pm Children & Family Worship:** This child friendly and interactive worship will include a sweet and simple retelling of the night of Jesus' birth and the singing of Christmas Carols. (*Childcare provided.*)
- **7pm Lessons & Carols:** This traditional favorite celebrates the birth of Christ through the reading of scriptures, singing favorite Christmas carols with the choir, organ and brass ensemble. (In person and live streamed; childcare provided.)
- **9pm Carols & Communion:** This worship will be similar to the 7pm service, with the addition of communion being served. *(Choir, organ and brass ensemble.)*Note: "Silent Night" will be sung by candlelight at the 4pm, 7pm and 9pm worship services, proclaiming Christ comes with love and redeems with grace.
- **11pm Silent Night on the front steps:** Singing "Silent Night" on the front steps and witnessing to our community the light and love of Christ.

To ensure hospitality and protection for all persons, masks will be required during the entire worship experience. We urge you to be vaccinated and, if available, be tested before you attend, and if you are not feeling well, please join us via our live streamed worship. Our Christmas Eve worship is well attended by the greater Kalamazoo community. As persons who attend regularly, we ask that you consider staggering your attendance throughout the evening as this will help to create two full worship services, not one overly full worship service. Choir and brass will be a part of leading worship at both the 7pm and 9pm services. We would also ask that you might consider sitting in the balcony as you are familiar with it. We will also plan to have overflow in Wesley Hall and the parlor.

Last year our only in person event was "Silent Night" on the front steps. As the snowflakes drifted from the dark night sky; we knew we had come upon a beautiful tradition. For all who may be hesitant to worship inside, we hope you will consider coming for this simple but inspiring gathering. It is also a witness to our community as we sing to those who may be in the park admiring the lights and paying homage to the nativity.

O Come, o come Emmanuel! On this night, we remember God has come in the Christ Child.

FUMC Kalamazoo is Home to a Little Free Library

In August 2013, Dolores Heidanus and the Outreach team approved the distribution of new books to children who visit our food pantry. Since that time, we have given over 4,000 books to children who otherwise may not have had a book of their own.

Research shows that during the first 3 years of life, important brain development is happening and it is critical that children are read to as they begin the path to becoming readers. In Kalamazoo County alone, nearly 25,000 adults are not functionally literate which translates into being unable to read a job application, prescription label, a story to their child and other tasks involving print.



Plans for the distribution of food in our food pantry have changed but thanks to the efforts of Dionna Roberts and Kellen Dean, one of 32 beautifully painted Little Free Libraries has been planted at our church. Each of the 32 libraries are placed with the intent of reaching children who may live in what is considered a "book desert." The libraries, painted by local artists, provide diverse books in an effort to have all children see themselves in literature.

Not only will families with children visiting the pantry have access to new books but also the children of First Care. We are grateful to join this Kalamazoo Art of Planting Little Free Libraries effort as we continue to work toward creating a literate Kalamazoo by providing books for all children from birth. November was a busy month for the Finance Committee. We wrapped up budget discussions and presented the Church Council with a 2022 Budget of \$1,133,592.

Our income increased a little again in October. We had income of \$61,619 and expenses of \$82,985. That gives us a monthly deficit of \$21,366. Our income from pledges continues to be strong and we once again had an increase in offering plate income in October.

If you have not already, please return your pledge cards for next year. You can also complete your pledge card online on the Churches website. Your pledges are crucial for us to plan for next year's activities.

Helping Our Neighbors Launches Phase 2 of the Phone Ministry Project

Last winter while distributing sleeping bag coats to homeless folks at the encampments, we often asked our friends what they needed most: "a cell phone" was a frequent answer. Many didn't have a phone to make appointments for job interviews or doctor checkups; in fact, neither could they contact family members or other camp members who were also struggling. Also concerning was the fact that when they saw trouble break out, they couldn't even call 911!

A grant from the United Methodist Michigan Conference Board of Justice, along with gifts from our church's Helping Our Neighbors program, Special Ministries Fund and the Memorial Fund, as well as a gift from another local congregation, allowed us to begin Phase 1 of the HON Phone Ministry Project at Ministry with Community on October 22, 2021.



The need was overwhelming! Scores of people need a cell phone, but are without the means to buy one. That's why our church's Phone Ministry Project needs to continue. In order for us to move forward, we need more funding. Our goal for Phase 2 is \$15,000. That seems like a lot, but think what it can do. This amount would enable us to provide another 100 phones and accessories to some of our neighbors "who ain't got it so good."

While any donation would be helpful, if 100 people will donate an average of \$150, this dream can become a reality. What a joy it was to hear from Danielle, who only a few days after we gave her a phone, had been able to set up a job interview and was on her way to Target to begin her new job! Or to see the gleam in the eyes of Gloria who, at age 71, was given her FIRST EVER cell phone. As Tim Mullikin and I helped her set it up, our hearts melted at her excitement and gratitude!

Think of how important your cell phone is to you and then think of those who need one, but can't afford one. We hope you will help by becoming part of our Adopt a Phone endeavor. There are multiple ways to give:

The Reconciling Ministry Team is organizing the **Big Deal Weekend from March 18-20, 2022** and the theme is "Intersection: exploring identity in Christ through faith and antiracism." Read on for details on upcoming lead up events to help us learn and prepare!

January 9-February 13, Sunday morning class at 11:15am following worship in person in the Parlor at FUMC Kalamazoo or online via Zoom: Author Ibram X. Kendi says that no one can say that they are "not a racist." The two choices are "racist" and "antiracist." We invite you to join Dan Duncan and Mark Stucky in a study of Kendi's book *How to Be an Antiracist*. Antiracism is a transformative concept that reorients and reenergizes the conversation about racism—and, even more fundamentally, points us toward liberating new ways of thinking about ourselves and each other...this is an essential work for anyone who wants to go beyond the awareness of racism to the next step: contributing to the formation of a just and equitable society. We will meet in the Parlor after worship for six weeks beginning Sunday, January 9 or you may join us remotely using Zoom. January 13 at 7pm in the parlor at FUMC Kalamazoo: Visual Media Series event. In her new book *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents*, a #1 *New York Times* bestseller and Oprah's Book Club pick, Isabel Wilkerson explores the impact of the American caste system—a rigid hierarchy of human divisions—and its connections to caste systems in India and Nazi Germany. She documents how the Nazis studied American race laws as they planned the German Nuremberg Laws, and she points forward to ways that we can move beyond artificial and destructive separations towards a common humanity. In this program, Wilkerson and Rabbi Angela Warnick Buchdahl, Senior Rabbi at New York's Central Synagogue and the first Asian-American person to be ordained as cantor or rabbi in North America, discuss *Caste*, the legacy of the Holocaust, and what lies under the surface of American life today. - Without diapers, babies cannot attend childcare facilities or participate in early childhood education.
- 1 in 3 US moms reports suffering from diaper need.
- Diapers can cost \$70-\$100 a month and babies need 6-10 diapers a day.
- Diaper need impacts the health (mental, physical, and emotional) as well as the economic well being of children and their caregivers.
- Low income families are not as likely to have private laundry facilities, meaning cloth diapers are not an option.
