# **YANA Celebrating the Legacy**

Last Thursday, I had the opportunity to sit down and talk with Ray Sweany about YANA (You Are Not Alone). It's not every day that I meet people who care so deeply about others, although since I started working at this church, I encounter more and more of these extraordinary individuals. Ray's passion for YANA and the good it did was palpable.

YANA was birthed out of the necessity that arose when Martha's Table, a meal-providing initiative at First Congregational Church, was announced to be suspending its services. Ray, a chemistry professor and avid runner, along with others at First United Methodist Church, took it upon themselves to fill this gap.

Ray's understanding of nutrition, developed from his academic background and personal fitness habits, played a key role in shaping YANA. He was very aware that those in need often struggled to access nutritious meals, and he was adamant about offering balanced, fiber-rich meals, carefully considering the essential macronutrients - fats, proteins, and carbohydrates.

There was a moment during our conversation when Ray shared a touching story from the YANA program. One of the regular attendees asked to read the John Wesley quote inscribed on the walls of Wesley Hall: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." This heartfelt incident underlined the spiritual resonance that YANA had for its community, serving not only as a provider of meals but also as a spiritual haven.

Ray told me that these weekly dinners often served as a form of "church" for many attendees. He would commence each gathering with a heartfelt, inclusive prayer, setting the tone for an evening of not only feeding bodies but also nourishing souls and nurturing community bonds.

Ray also mentioned that the generosity didn't stop within the walls of Wesley Hall. Many attendees would take food from the dinners to share with those outside the church who were in need, extending the circle of compassion and care further into the community. In retrospect, YANA's legacy is evident not just in the nutritious meals it provided but in the community it built. It showcased the power of faith and love in action.

As we close this chapter of our communal journey, let's remember the words of John Wesley, words that inspired and guided us through our YANA journey: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." It is in the spirit of these words that we will continue to serve, to care, to love, and to make a difference, one meal, one smile, one act of kindness at a time.
