

Juneteenth

Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, is a unique holiday commemorating the end of slavery on June 19, 1865. It's a day for reflection, education, and unity, underscoring the importance of freedom, equality, and human rights in our society. This celebration is not about division, but about inclusivity and unity. It's an opportunity to come together, learn from one another, and commit ourselves to ensure that the principles of freedom, equality, and justice are upheld for everyone.

Juneteenth is all about dialogue and understanding across cultural and racial lines. It's a day that invites us to engage in thoughtful discussions, learn more about each other's experiences, and work towards a more understanding society.

Education is a significant component of Juneteenth, as it aims to increase awareness and understanding of the African American experience, and the systemic issues they have faced, and continue to face. This is not designed to create guilt or animosity, but instead it aims to encourage empathy, to spark conversations about equity, and to inspire action towards a more just society.

Our reconcling ministry has recommended a book titled "On Juneteenth" by Anette Gordon-Reed. This book is an eye-opening read for anyone seeking a deeper understanding of this pivotal moment in American history, its echoes in our present, and its implications for our future.

NEW in the PEWS! Attendance Registers return to the sanctuary.

You may have noticed that at the end of May, new blue folders appeared at the end of each pew; you know, those notepads to write your name in and pass along to neighboring worshippers. In these months since the global pandemic, we've experimented with ways to best capture accurate attendance, and after the last Sunday in May, it is confirmed that pencil and paper works best for us! However, as we experimented, some questions arose I'd like to address.

- 1. Why does the church want me to "sign in" to worship?
- 2. What does the church do with that information?
- 3. Why does the church care about who is in church or when?

Good questions. The church seeks to gather accurate information about attendance to better serve the needs of the church community. The attendance registers are an easy way to communicate changes in contact information to the office staff. The information gathered is stored in a database for later reference. I could go into much more detail about that, and if any of you are data geeks, give me a call and we can talk about data.

Why does the church care? The truth is, this church \vdash your church, does care. This church has a Director of Congregational Care, an active Caring Team, and Stephen Ministers. All are evidence this church considers caring for one another a top tier priority.

How does recording attendance correspond to the church's ability to care though? Well, one way the staff uses specific attendance information is to verify our memories, which can sometimes be mistaken. For instance, a pastor may notice an absence of someone who had previously been in worship all the time. The pastor could check with support staff to verify before follow-up. Another example could be if the clergy or caring team are aware of a circumstance that would keep a church member away from worship and when they return, a caring visit could acknowledge and celebrate the ability to be together again. Sometimes attendance information can be helpful in naming people in general. We're a church with hundreds of participating people that may not be recognized by a worship leader from the front of the church, but with a quick check of attendance sheets, we can help make those connections of names and faces.

The response to the new-in-the-pews attendance pads was fantastic! We thank you and encourage everyone to use those blue attendance registers each week as we seek to maintain and strengthen our connections to one another.
