A New Chapter in The United Methodist Church: Embracing Change and Widening the Table

Bishop David Bard shared some transformative updates in a recent letter from General Conference. In his letter to the Michigan Conference Bishop Bard shares some of the most significant updates from the 2020 General Conference. The conference implemented three changes, known as "The Three R's" - Regionalization, Revision of The United Methodist Social Principles, and Removal of language limiting LBGTQ+ participation. These changes mark a shift towards a more inclusive, decentralized church structure, with a renewed commitment to social justice and ethical living.

As we explore these changes, we begin a new chapter in the church's history.

The Three R's: A Historic Shift

The General Conference was quite eventful, with a steady stream of news and updates. Among the legislative proposals and various insights, the Three R's were particularly noteworthy for signaling change and progress. Regionalization is about giving more control and flexibility to local church bodies, which supports cultural adaptability. The update to The United Methodist Social Principles shows a stronger dedication to social justice and ethical practices. Importantly, eliminating restrictions on LBGTQ+ participation is a major move toward being more inclusive.

Widening the Table

The Bishop has been a strong advocate for fostering inclusivity within The United Methodist Church. These recent changes are in alignment with that vision. Now, pastors can officiate at weddings without the burden of ecclesiastical charges, regardless of whether the couple is in a same-sex relationship. Individuals are encouraged to respond to God's call on their lives, and the Boards of Ordained Ministry will discern these calls, irrespective of sexual orientation.

For those who may find these developments challenging, the Bishop offers reassurance. We are now genuinely embracing the ability to agree to disagree without fear of church penalties or punitive processes. Appointments will continue to be made, thoughtfully considering the church and community context. Churches and pastors will have the autonomy to make decisions about weddings, reflecting the evolving landscape of inclusivity and acceptance.

Looking Ahead

As we process these significant changes, the Bishop encourages us to remain centered in the risen Christ and anchored in our Scriptures. The aspiration is for The United Methodist Church to shift its focus more freely toward its mission: making disciples of Jesus Christ. Through this mission, people can encounter the healing and liberating grace of God in their lives, contributing to a world that becomes more just, loving, and compassionate.

As we step into this new chapter, we eagerly anticipate sharing this ministry journey together, embracing change, and expanding our table.
